Measures 3 and 4 continue the eighth-note patterns with grace notes. The dynamics remain consistent with the previous measures.

THE TRIPLET

GALOP.

Four couples stand as for a set of Quadrilles.
(8 bars before beginning)

1st FIGURE. The four couples galop with four steps into next couples place and turn half round the same round to places. (8 bars)

2nd FIGURE. The first couple galop alone with four steps towards each couples place all round (8 bars) the 2nd 3rd and 4th couples do the same. (24 bars)

3rd FIGURE. The four couples advance with 4 slow setting steps to the centre and galop round to left to places. (8 bars)

4th FIGURE. The first figure repeated

5th FIGURE. The first couple galop between the opposite couple and return outside (a tiroir) the side couples the same, this is repeated (32 bars)

6th FIGURE. The 3rd figure repeated.

7th FIGURE. The 1st figure repeated.

8th FIGURE. The 1st couple do the Valse galop round the centre of set (8 bars) the 2nd 3rd and 4th couples do the same (24 bars)

9th Figure. The 3rd figure repeated.

10th FIGURE. The 1st figure to finish.

VALSE À DEUX TEMPS.

(The first part of tune is played before beginning.)

The 1st couple valse round 2nd 3rd & 4th couples and then round outside of set to places (32 bars) The other couples do the same. (96 bars)

POLKA.

(The 1st part is played once before beginning and then as written.)

1st FIGURE. The four couples set with two steps and then waltz with two steps into next couples places this is done four times, round to places (16 bars).

2nd FIGURE. The 1st & 3rd couples advance and retire (with one waltz step and one setting step) and waltz with four steps into each others places, advance and retire and waltz round to their own places (16 bars) The side couples the same.

3rd FIGURE. The 1st figure repeated.

4th FIGURE. The first gentleman advances (his partner retiring) with four steps, and reverse waltz to places four steps (8 bars) the 2nd 3rd & 4th couples do the same.

5th FIGURE. The first figure repeated.

6th FIGURE. The 1st & 3rd couples waltz into each others places and reverse waltz round to their own (8 bars) side couples the same. This is repeated. (16 bars)

7th FIGURE. The 1st figure to finish.
